

CAMBO OIL FIELD – CALL TO REJECT APPROVAL

Dear Prime Minister,

The UK Government is due to make a decision on whether to approve the controversial Cambo oil field west of Shetland. The first phase of the Cambo Field would produce over 170 million barrels of crude oil - the emissions equivalent of 18 coal fired power plants running for a year. If approved, production in the Cambo Field will begin in 2025 and run until 2050: the same year the UK is to be net zero. We are writing to you now to call on the Government to reject the approval for Cambo; and that you take the opportunity to align UK oil and gas policy with limiting warming to 1.5C, as outlined in the Paris Agreement.

As the host of COP26, it is vital for the UK's international leadership credentials on climate change for it to walk the walk on all aspects of domestic energy policy. The Government has succeeded in mobilising the G7 behind the 1.5C target, which we strongly support. However, approving the Cambo Field will threaten this progress and stall our efforts at climate diplomacy at the exact moment we need them to accelerate. It will be hard to avoid the irony of world leaders meeting in Glasgow to discuss how to achieve a 1.5 degree world, while the UK Government contemplates a new oil field just over 300 miles to the north.

Approval of a new oil field the size of Cambo would contradict the recommendations of both UNEP and the International Energy Agency (IEA) on how we can meet 1.5C. The IEA report - which was commissioned by Alok Sharma as the COP26 President - reinforces this message, making clear that investment in new oil and gas fields must end this year to be on track. The 2020 UNEP Production Gap report also set out a clear imperative for countries to act to reduce global oil and gas supply by an average of 4% and 3% respectively per year over the next decade in order to be consistent with 1.5C.

Development of the Cambo Field is therefore inconsistent with a 1.5C world, and must not go ahead. To ensure a sustainable transition for the domestic oil and gas industry consistent with the 1.5C target which does not lead to stranded assets, significant decommissioning costs to the public purse, and a sudden collapse in local employment, we call on the Government to:

- Reject the Cambo Field and all future projects which contradict the findings of the IEA net zero and UNEP 1.5C pathways calling for no further investment in new oil, gas and coal supply.
- Immediately end the issue of any new licences to explore for and extract oil and gas in the North Sea.
- End subsidies (direct and indirect) for oil and gas extraction (including the current exemptions for public finance through PIDG and CDC) and re-direct to green industry.
- Make a plan to deliver a managed and equitable UK energy transition in line with 1.5C, involving extensive engagement with oil and gas workers, trade unions and affected communities, and including major investment in skills and training.
- End the policy of Maximum Economic Recovery (MER) for the North Sea, replacing the Oil and Gas Authority's legal mandate with one that aligns the sector with a 1.5 C pathway, accounting for the UK's historic responsibility for emissions and an obligation to take the lead as a developed nation.

Cambo provides an opportunity for the UK - as a major OECD oil and gas producer - to lead the way on a managed phase-out of its domestic supply. Action now would cement the Government's climate credentials in the run-up to COP26 and beyond, support a sustainable transition for affected workers, and help to catalyse the global transformation needed to be on track for 1.5C.

As demonstrated by the latest climate events in North America, Germany and the millions of people in the south of Madagascar who are currently facing hunger due to climate-induced drought, more and more of the world will soon be too hot and too inhospitable for humans unless decisive action is taken now.

The Government has shown itself as a global leader on ending public finance for fossil fuel projects overseas. In the lead-up to COP26, it is essential that we are seen to be walking the walk at home and that UK climate leadership is extended to cover domestic oil and gas Extraction.

We are copying this letter to Alok Sharma, the President of COP26, and to Kwasi Kwarteng and Anne-Marie Trevelyan, the responsible Ministers at BEIS.
